
Nursery and Reception

Last week, Stoke class explored the primary colours and which other colours they could create, worked on scissors skills by cutting out shapes to make a penguin and made their own, individual apple crumbles to take home. Yum!



Year 1 and Year 2

In English we have been inspired by the story Jack and the Beanstalk. We have been learning how to use capital letters, full stops and question marks and really impressing Mrs Kolodynska with our incredible vocabulary when retelling parts of the story. We've been fully immersed in our Geography learning about the difference between villages, towns and cities and naming the village or town we live in. We linked our artwork to our learning in geography and created some detailed and colourful collages. In maths we have been counting backwards, recognising and spelling number names and adding one more. Year 2 have been using a range of ways to represent tens and ones for the same number using the part whole model.



Year 3, 4, 5 and 6

This week we have been learning about the different parts of a plant and we've created our own amazing prototypes and models. We have also completed a STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths) challenge which was 'egg-ceptional' and took a lot of planning and perseverance. We are happy to report that most of the eggs survived their landing – great teamwork everyone!

In history, we looked at where Ancient Egypt fits into our timeline of history. We then drew our own timelines, noting the length of different historical periods and comparing British and world history.







Forest School

Years 1/2/3 focused on leaves at forest school last week. We talked about the changing seasons and identified the different trees and leaves in our woodland area.

The children worked in pairs to select and classify leaves in different ways, for example, by size, type or colour, with the expectation that they could explain and justify their choices to a grown up. Fantastic teamwork, communication, and reasoning.

Thank you for all your support with attendance and ensuring your child/ren are arriving at school before the registration window closes at 9:05.

Why is attendance at school and punctuality important? Because every second counts.

90% attendance may sound good. However, this is the equivalent of missing a half day of schooling EACH WEEK. If this continues over every five years a child spends at school, a child with 90% attendance will miss HALF A YEAR'S schooling.

A child with 80% attendance will lose A FULL YEAR of schooling over the same period.

MONITOR SPENDING
