## **Classroom News**

### Nursery and Reception

This week Stoke class learnt about South African Independence Day from Alice. They saw photos of her time living there, tasted foods and listened to music. A wonderful, rich learning experience.

We had a friendship café set up in the class to focus on language and communication skills. The children chose a friend to sit with, made and buttered their own toast and washed up afterwards, ready for the next customers!

We also explored maths outside, finding examples of natural objects up to 5 and chopped and made our own vegetable soup, linked to our story of the week 'Pumpkin soup' by Helen Cooper.



### Year 1 and Year 2

We have been learning about properties of materials in science, testing waterproof and absorbency. In art we have been looking at the work of Henri Matisse and creating our collages inspired by his work. In maths, we are learning about addition and subtraction.



### Year 3 and 4

WOW! What a week of learning we have had in Mothecombe class. We are entering our 'final write' stage and the children will be applying all they have learnt to an independent piece of writing next week. They have used their great sense of humour to bring their characters to life and I am looking forward to reading their final piece. Our first topic of 'Place Value' in maths is nearly complete and we have all shown to be keen mathematicians. I am very excited to see what they achieve next!

Finally, we visited Carswell Farm on Thursday. What a treat for the children! Having never been myself, I marvelled at how knowledgeable and 'hands on' the children were. We made bread, identified different crops, apple picked and went on a colour hunt. The children built some excellent dens and we also learnt about hedgehogs. We even made our own hedgehogs and hedgehog poo!



### Year 5 and 6

Bigbury have had a fantastic week. We have been learning about the ancient Egyptians in history and how they used to write using hieroglyphics. The children practised writing words in hieroglyphics, then used the symbols and pictures to create their own sentences for each other to translate! Everyone has also worked hard in maths, developing their understanding of place value and numbers up to 10 million. Well done for all your hard work this week, Bigbury class!


